10 VERB TENSE SHIFT

Verbs have **tense** forms which indicate different times: **past**, for actions or states completed in the past; **present**, for actions or states occurring at the time of the speaking or occurring regularly; and **future**, for actions or states that will occur in the future. Tense is crucial to our understanding of when actions occur. The verb tense within a sentence or a related group of sentences **should not shift** without good reason.

No: One night, I <u>was</u> driving home late. Suddenly, I <u>see</u> Bigfoot in the path of my Taurus. I <u>slam</u> on my brakes and barely <u>avoid</u> hitting it. (shift from past to present tense)

Yes: One night, I <u>was</u> driving home late. Suddenly, I <u>saw</u> Bigfoot in the path of my Taurus. I <u>slammed</u> on my brakes and barely <u>avoided</u> hitting it. (all past tense verbs)



REMEMBER:

- Do not shift from present tense to past tense within a sentence without good reason.
 No: Beyoncé <u>nets</u> a cool \$54.4 million a year, while the average teacher <u>earned</u> \$46,284 each year.
 - Yes: Beyoncé <u>nets</u> a cool \$54.4 million a year, while the average teacher <u>earns</u> \$46,284 each year.
- 2. Do not shift from past tense to present tense within a sentence without good reason.
 - No: The judge <u>told</u> the defendant that Her Honor would not release him unless he <u>promises</u> to undergo drug treatment.
 - Yes: The judge <u>told</u> the defendant that Her Honor would not release him unless he <u>promised</u> to undergo drug treatment.
- 3. Sometimes the context of the sentence requires a change in tense in one or more of the clauses.
 - Ex: Because of "school choice" laws <u>passed</u> in the last few years, parents now <u>have</u> options for where to send their children if their schools <u>are</u> failing. (necessary shift from past tense to present tense.)
 - Ex: The Wizard of Oz is a film that has enchanted audiences since it was made in 1939. (necessary shift from present tense to past tense)
